

# Why Book Fight the New Drug

—Due to the advent of the internet and the ubiquity of the smartphone, pornography is more accessible, affordable, anonymous and available than ever before and one study found that most kids are exposed to porn by age 13.\*

Decades of studies from respected academic institutions have demonstrated significant impacts of porn consumption for individuals, relationships, and society, yet very few individuals are aware of these impacts.

### How Pornography Impacts:

### Individuals

- $\rightarrow$  Porn can change the brain
- → Porn can be habit-forming
- → Porn consumption can become an escalating behavior
- → Porn can negatively impact mental health

## Relationships

- Porn can negatively impact love, intimacy, and relationship satisfaction
- → Porn can normalize and fuel objectification

## Society

- → Porn often normalizes and promotes sexual violence
- → Porn can fuel discrimination
- → Porno is linked to sex trafficking and fuels sexual exploitation

# A Presentation with an Impact

—Since 2011, Fight the New Drug has delivered over 1,800 live presentations and reached over 1 million individuals. Our presentations have proven to be effective in educating individuals on the harmful effects of porn so they can become empowered to make an informed decision regarding porn for themselves.

To gauge audiences' understanding of the harmful effects of pornography, and to help determine the success of each event, Fight the New Drug provides individuals an opportunity to complete a survey before and after live presentations. Over the years, the data collected from these surveys show that across all demographics, a majority of audience members change their views surrounding pornography after hearing an FTND presentation.



Yes. We have a non-legislative approach to our message, we have no religious agenda, we do not discuss this topic from a moral perspective, and our content is appropriate for schools.
